Dear partners and friends,

We start a new fiscal year with immense gratitude for the rapidly-expanding ways that God has allowed us to share life-giving perspectives and practices across our global network. We are doing our part to develop leaders who seek the peace of cities to which they are called. A big part of our gratitude is for you—collaborating with us in such fruitful work.

The expansion this past year has been a whirlwind, which brings its own challenges. Presently I have the simple challenge of putting a human face on the numbers and outcomes we celebrate in the pages that follow. They represent so many lives and stories! But what does impact actually look like on our streets?

I'll pick one close to home and heart. On a May morning a few blocks from my own front porch, a group of us stood on a freshly blood-stained sidewalk. Before us in the weeds was a makeshift memorial with teddy bears, candles, and love notes. A young father had been gunned down as he was walking from the funeral of his uncle, who himself had been murdered days earlier.

Our group had assembled on the sidewalk to perform a "Moment of Blessing" before heading to a Street Psalms training retreat for urban leaders and others. Among us were a Black Lives Matter regional director, a wealthy philanthropist with right-wing politics, a left-wing pastor who relishes the word "liberal," an evangelical suburban preacher, a young emerging leader in the 'hood, an entrepreneur, and Denver Training Hub partner Jeff Johnsen—as well as Kris, Stephanie, and I from our staff. Try leading dialogical training with that bunch!

By day's end, we'd have processed words upon words: powerpoints, handouts, and lively debate on urban challenges and transformation. But out on that sidewalk, as you can imagine, words fell away. Silence held us for a good bit. We knew we were on holy ground.

We passed around copies of our Moment of Blessing liturgy—a ceremony the Street Psalms network practices where there has been a violent death in our communities—and began to let it guide us. Moments into our responsive readings, a passing car slowed and then came to a stop before us. "Hmm, could be trouble," I couldn't help thinking. Out of the car and into our circle stepped a trembling woman. "I'm his mother" she said of the man whose death had brought us there.

This grieving mother served notice, if we needed it, that this holy ground was not ours. But she expressed no resentment; only anguish. And how the anguish gushed! This place of violence was terrible strange ground for her even more than for us. At the end the liturgy, after expressing by faith that this ground was reclaimed in God's love, we simply held each other.

But that was not the end. Debriefing later, we remembered how this grieving mother pled for counseling services she couldn't afford. Heads, hearts and hands together—from this wildly diverse cohort—came up with a plan that day. A month later, we gathered many of these same leaders for another training retreat, meeting with our city's urban planners to address structural challenges in our most vulnerable communities.

This is the work we are blessed to do. We hope you'll be encouraged, as you read the next pages, by the fruit of your partnership this year!

Street Psalms INSTITUTE

Street Psalms is managing partner of the global Urban Training Collaborative (UTC), in partnership with Leadership Foundations and Christian Reformed World Missions. This past year the UTC's global network of 10 training hubs served missional partner organizations and individuals worldwide through a cohort model of training and a virtual hub hosted on the Street Psalms website.

In fiscal year 2015 the UTC facilitated six monthly cohorts exploring the head (theological reflection), heart (spiritual formation), and hands (social action) of mission.

- Organizational Directors (trained 6 leaders)
- Global Network of Training Directors (trained 10 leaders)
- Community Chaplains (trained 31 leaders)
- Training Collaborative Leadership Team (trained 5 leaders)
- Leadership Foundations Senior Associates (trained 10 leaders)
- Street Psalms Community (trained 9 ordained leaders)

In addition to UTC offerings, Street Psalms offers local trainings:

In Tacoma, Washington, Street Psalms hosts a weekly lectionary group and quarterly Urban Lecture Series; and in Denver, Colorado, we organize a monthly missional leader gathering; as well as numerous speaking/preaching engagements at conferences and churches, and one-two day intensive trainings and public liturgies.

At our annual UTC Hub directors gathering and training, held this year in Minneapolis, MN, the UTC established a core curriculum and offered a training summit for local leaders.

UTC Hub leaders also held regional summits in their respective contexts:

- Pretoria, South Africa: 184 participants from 17 cities and 16 countries
- Guatemala City, Guatemala: 72 participants from 10 countries
- Minneapolis, Minnesota, U.S.: 75 participants including 23 Hub directors and staff
- Denver, Colorado, U.S.: 2 retreat intensives trained a total of 25 local leaders

The leaders we train undergo a series of paradigm shifts that unleash the hidden potential in themselves and they cities they serve.

Message: Scarcity to Abundance

Leaders learn to employ an asset-based vision of life that begins with God's yes, rooted in the assumption there is enough—enough of all the ingredients for human flourishing in every context. We help leaders pay attention to how the Spirit is already at work in our cities and joyfully participate in unleashing forces for good.

Method: Theory to Incarnational Practice

Leaders learn to practice the incarnational vision of Jesus that begins with the lived experience of those who are most vulnerable, demonstrating the incarnational presence of Christ among the dispossessed.

Manner: Rivalry to Peacemaking

Leaders learn to enact a vision of civil society rooted in the biblical vision of shalom. They practice unplugging from the violence of rivalry and exclusion, instead modeling life-giving relationships in which enemies are embraced as friends and all parties are mutually transformed.

Messenger: Fear to Freedom

Leaders embody the freedom of Christ who is transforming our cities from the inside out.

This year we revamped our website, launching a virtual training and resource hub at www.streetpsalms.org.

Our new website offers an open libary full of training resources for the head, hands, and heart of global leaders.

We continue to offer life-giving practices and perspectives through our publishing arm.

This year our weekly "Word From Below" theological reflection emails, our website library, and our books *Geography of Grace* and *Meal from Below* resourced thousands of readers



In addition, Street Psalms and Leadership Foundations developed a training manual for the UTC outlining life-giving theological foundations, perspectives, and best practices for leaders serving in hard urban places.

The Street Psalms ordained community continues to meet monthly to energize our work and hold each other in prayer.

This past year we also laid the groundwork for growth by inviting a new cohort of novitiates into the discernment and training process for joining the Street Psalms Community. Street Psalms continued nurturing partnerships with Christian

Reformed World Missions, Leadership
Foundations, Mile High Ministries,
and Mercy Ministries. We developed a
new partnership with Fr. Richard Rohr's
Center for Action and Contemplation.
All three CTM sites—Guatemala City,
Santo Domingo, and Nairobi—are well
into the process of being certified as
Local Leadership Foundations. We are
committed to working alongside these and
other organizations that share in the work
of offering life-giving perspectives and
practices to leaders worldwide.














Having laid a solid foundation for growth, this year sees Street Psalms taking giant steps forward with the Urban Training Collaborative (UTC). Street Psalms has officially assumed the role of Managing Partner of the UTC. Thanks to the generosity of Christian Reformed World Missions, we welcomed Street Psalms staff member Joel Van Dyke as Director of the UTC. In November 2015 the UTC will host hundreds of international leaders in Guatemala City for the "Synergy" conference.

Other upcoming UTC training hub summits include gatherings of leaders in Denver, CO; Nairobi, Kenya; and Pretoria, South Africa.

Our network of UTC regional training hubs continues to grow as we add partners from Port-au-Prince, Haiti, and continue conversations with leaders in additional global urban centers.

We also look forward to deepening a new relationship with Fr. Richard Rohr's Center for Action and Contemplation.

We are constantly adding resources developed by our networks around the world to the virtual hub at www.streetpsalms.org.

Drawing from the collective work and knowledge of our training partners, we are developing a comprehensive UTC training curriculum and accompanying facilitators' guide to be released this year.

In the coming year we will double the number of learning cohorts trained by Street Psalms staff from six to twelve. These seasoned leaders serve as "multipliers" who extend our impact into many regions and communities.

Thanks to our generous supporters, this year we continued laying the foundation for growth as we built partnerships worldwide and relaunched our website as an open resource library.


