Incarnational Framework: Overview

- Three main movements See, Do, and Be.
- These **Free** us up in the context of community a Community in Mission.
 - See, Do, Be \rightarrow Freedom
 - Freedom not reckless, doing whatever we want. Rather it is when we fully embrace the invitation to participate in the ongoing act of co-creation.
- For those of us coming from a Christian faith tradition, Jesus is our model. We also recognize that other faith traditions provide similar models.

Incarnational Framework: Overview

The Incarnational Framework:

- Functions as a **diagnostic tool** designed to help leaders and all members of their organizations assess their freedom to love and serve.
- Asks a **common set of questions** that unlock individuals and organizations in the shape of their own vocation and call.
- Is a **rule of life** for Street Psalms; these common questions unite us.

Scarcity to Abundance - Does your way of *seeing* call you out of the myth of scarcity into the reality of abundance?

- **The lie: There is not enough!** We are driven by a vision of need, problems, deficiency and lack.
- The truth: There is enough! We are drawn by a vision of opportunity and possibility present in all things. This perspective frees us to cooperate and find ways of sharing and distributing resources equitably. This creates the conditions for authentic community.





Theory to Practice - Does your way of *doing* call you out of theory into practice?

- The lie: Humans are primarily rational beings. It prioritizes disembodied ideas and ideologies over real relationships and lived experiences. It is a "top down" approach.
- The truth: Humans are primarily relational beings. This bottom up, embodied approach resists the temptation to do things "to" or "for" those we serve. Instead it invites us to walk "with" those we serve.





Rivalry to Peacemaking - Does your way of *being* call you out of rivalry into peacemaking?

- **The lie: The other is foe.** It is a posture of engagement in which the "other" is seen as a threat. It creates the conditions for scapegoats. Leads to unending cycles of violence.
- The truth: The other is friend. It is a posture of engagement that taps into the underlying unity of all things. This creates a culture of hospitality and belonging. Leads to lasting peace, well-being and wholeness for all.

- stands to make the biggest, positive change towards freedom for you? For your community?





Does your way of seeing, doing and being call forth a Community in Mission that is *free* to love and serve?

- Freedom is not the shallow freedom of pop culture that is reduced to "I can do whatever I want."
- Instead, it is a deep freedom of those who have recognized and embraced their call to participate in the ongoing act of co-creation and freely choose to take responsibility for it.
- It is important for us as individuals and as communities. Free communities are Communities in Mission.
